
I am issuing a BIG challenge to all clubs with this newsletter. Look further inside for the **March of Diapers** Challenge. And start counting...



Lone moose had already lost his antlers.




March of Diapers

Turn a Guest into A Member

- 1. Prepare name badges for everyone guests and members.
- 2. Let members know about the program in advance so they can plan to attend. Encourage members to arrive early so they can welcome the guests and make them comfortable.
- 3. Remind members to thank the guests for attending and to invite them to join or attend another meeting.
- 4. Provide a meaningful introduction for each guest.
- 5. Arrange a quality program.
- 6. Make the meeting a positive experience. Don't ask them to purchase raffle tickets, etc.
- 7. Explain the procedures to the guests in advance so they are comfortable with the format of the meeting.
- 8. **Run an efficient meeting** by having the room set prior to the guests' arrival, starting and ending on time and leaving adequate time for the program.
- 9. Advise the presenters of the program in advance about the allotted amount of time for the program.
- 10. Avoid "federation" lingo during the meeting so that guests will understand what is happening during the meeting. Perhaps have a key person sit next to each member in case questions arise.
- 11. Have membership information packets available for guests after the meeting.
- 12. Make follow-up calls to guests within a few days after the meeting.

GFWC-WS Leadership Education and Development Seminar (LEADS)

NEW DEADLINE TO APPLY: February 21, 2025

The GFWC Leadership Education and Development Seminar (LEADS) program is intended to identify GFWC members at the local level who have the potential and the desire to assume leadership positions in our State Federation and/or GFWC beyond our state. Participation in GFWC LEADS can help up-and-coming leaders gain the capabilities, confidence, and commitment necessary to pursue and achieve higher office and serve with distinction. GFWC Washington State selects one LEADS attendee each year. GFWC LEADS is held annually the day before the official opening of the GFWC Annual Convention. The program may include an overview of various leadership skills; an explanation of GFWC resources, materials, and assistance; an outline of GFWC policies, procedure, and protocol; and discussions of tips and techniques for pursuing personal growth and developing leadership opportunities. Criteria for LEADS Participation: LEADS candidates should meet the following criteria:

- Demonstrates leadership capabilities at the club level as an active club president, club officer, or club project or committee chairman
- Exhibits a commitment to the Federation
- Exhibits an understanding of the GFWC mission of community service, illustrated by programs and projects in which she is or has been involved
- Demonstrates leadership skills, including, but not limited to, organization, responsibility, trustworthiness, enthusiasm, and flexibility
- Exhibits an interest in and willingness to pursue higher leadership positions in GFWC
- Agrees to share information gained from participation in LEADS with others in GFWC-WS and try to attend and share at the Fall GFWC WSR region conference.
- Has not held elected positions at or beyond the state level
- Is a current dues paying member and has not attended a previous LEADS program.

LEADS attendees are expected to be responsible for a portion of their expenses as an affirmation of their personal commitment and are responsible for making their own travel and lodging arrangements.

LEADS attendees receive:

Transportation and lodging stipend of \$325.00 from GFWC, checks are distributed to attendees at the completion of the seminar.

Lunch during the LEADS program (no registration fee is required) Additional travel stipend of

\$250 from GFWC-WS.

All photos of the event were posted in the Member Portal, so fun to see. Someday I hope to attend in person but for now, a few pictures below will have to suffice!





Washington Women Club members, you have an opportunity to become citizen scientists with as little as 15 minutes of time invested.. The Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) is happening on February 14-17. So what is the GBBC? It is an annual global event for beginning to expert birders. Each participant tallies birds seen, both species and number of species seen, and then repots their sightings on a bird recording app. This is a very important activity because the data gathered is used by scientists to monitor bird populations and distribution globally.

How to get involved:

Chose a location to observe the birds—backyard, local park, water Observe the area for at least 15 minutes on one or more of the 4 days Record your observations Submit your data to either Merlin Bird ID app: easiest to use E bird app or website: more for advanced birders.



So get out your bird book, look on-line for identification help, binoculars, paper and pencil and join this very important conservation program. And keep planting those native trees.

Let Your Voice Be Heard!

Members have an easy way to contact their U.S. Representatives and Senators through the GFWC Legislative Action Center also known as LAC.

GFWC and GFWC-WS Resolutions are actions voted on by the membership reflecting our non-partisan views on causes we support and becomes the policy of our



organization. Through the Legislative Action Center members can encourage their Senators and Representatives to vote for upcoming bills that reflect our Resolutions.

When a bill is up for a vote and is determined to reflect GFWC Resolutions, GFWC LAC sends an email to a LAC participant regarding the action to take. They even provide a prewritten letter and a way to email it directly to appropriate Congressional members.

In 2024, members of LAC sent letters concerning the following:

- Funding for programs that address domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence and stalking.
- Support of Shot @ Life.
- Protect children and stop online child sexual exploitation.
- Advocate for monument to woman's suffrage.
- Urged Congress support access to vaccines for all children.
- Urged Congress to enact the Elizabeth Dole Home Care Act.
- Urged Congress to reauthorize programs and increase federal research funding to ensure that
 individuals living with Alzheimer and other dementia, and their caregivers, have access to better
 quality care a support services.
- Protect Victims of Crimes Fund
- Eliminate out-of-pocket cost for supplemental breast cancer screenings.

Currently, 68 GFWC-WS members are signed up for LAC. Sign up and let your voice be heard! Here's how:

- 1) Sign up to receive emails from the Legislative Action Center through the GFWC Member Portal at https//gfwc.org. You <u>don't</u> have to login as a member to sign up!!!!
- 2) Click on the Advocacy tab, which brings up a dropdown box, click on Get Involved.
- 3) You will see a screen that starts with Act Now: Use our Legislative Alerts.

4) Scroll down slightly and look to the right and you will see Sign up for Alerts where you enter your email and zip code.



OLYMPIA CLUB JOINS WASHINGTON 250



The Washington State Legislature established the Semi quincentennial Committee via Senate Bill 5756 to coordinate and provide AMERICA'S 250TH guidance for Washington's official observance of the 250th anniverration of Independence in 1776. The committee is chaired by the

Lieutenant Governor and supported administratively by the Washington State Historical Society.

Washington's framework for the 250th anniversary of the founding of the United States creates ways for all communities to get involved in public history and commemorative activities. We ask Washingtonians to consider the Semi guincentennial around three themes: We the People, Power of Place, and Sharing History. Why these themes?
